The Federation Board members met on Sunday, 2 July at the Ardoise Community Hall. Items discussed:

The president will send a letter to all clubs & leaders inviting them to submit the names of dancers & leaders who are elligible for NS Federation awards. It was noted that these can be sent anytime prior to 30 March. It was noted that the CSRDS will present Awards of Excellence to Laurence & Alice Harrison and Gary & Dottie Welch at the Montreal National Convention. (This was done in front of a large audience there) Society Long-Service Awards were also given to Jack & Delores McArthur and Alex Ritchie. It was reported that MCCA had decided to reinstate the Basic Program as a locally recognized dance program. MCCA leaders may graduate dancers as Basic dancers once they have learned the basic program list (1-53). The Board decided to organize the next bi-annual NS Festival 2007. Dottie Welch volunteered to chair the organizing committee. Further details will be discussed at the first organizing meeting.

The Federation Annual General Meeting (AGM) will be held on 30 September at the Bible Hill Fire Hall at 2pm.



However, one day while paying a service call to Earle Kinsman's farm in Welsford, Earle encouraged him to come to Somerset to the Rainbow Dancers and renew his dancing, which he did. As time went by, Don met Amanda. Love blossomed and they were married. Square dancers were able to share in their joy. Over the years, Don and Amanda travelled to many Canadian destinations and such places as Hawaii and Japan, meeting new friends wherever they went. They loved to go to Five Islands to the square dance campout where Don always rushed to help other people get set up.

Don and Amanda served as Valley Representatives with the Nova Scotia Square and Round Dance Federation for a number of years. They were the Valley Square Dance King and Queen during one Apple Blossom Festival.

Don was a strong supporter of dancing. He made a special effort to make sure people without partners had an opportunity to dance and often joked about dancing with his "corner".

Don Robar is missed by his many square dance friends who are comforted to know that he died outdoors doing what he enjoyed. Don will be remembered for his positive outlook on life, his humble personality and his enthusiasm for square dancing.
